I beg to report that on the 10th inst. the undermentioned extremists were observed moving about and associating with each other as follows:-

With Thomas J. Clarke, 75 Parnell Street, P. Beasley, E. Kent, C. Colbert, and Wm. Mellows together for half an hour between 12 & 1 p.m.; Thomas Byrne, J. J. Buggy, John T. Kelly, T. C., and Countess Markievicz in conversation with Clarke for over half an hour between 10 and 11 p.m.; William O'Leary Curtis for a few minutes at 11 p.m., after which Clarke closed his premises for the night.

Bulmer Hobson and H. Mellows together in Volunteer Office, 2 Dawson Street, for close on two hours from 12.30 p.m. C. Colbert and J. Fitzgibbon in same place for a considerable time between 9 and 10 p.m.

About 25 members of the Sinn Fein Volunteers assembled at 25 Parnell Square at 8.20 p.m. and subsequently proceeded to 41 Parnell Square where they were joined by 40 others of the same Corps and all without rifles in command of Frank Fahy went route marching towards Fairview. They returned to 41 Parnell Square

at 10.20 p.m. where they disbanded without further

J.J. Walsh left his lodgings, 37 Haddington Road at 9.15 a.m. and walked to O'Connell Bridge. He then took a hackney car and drove to Kingsbridge where on arrival of 12.30 p.m. train from Cork he met a man apparently a carpenter with whom he proceeded to the shop 20 Blessington St. Both afterwards visited the Restaurant of Mrs. Wyse Power, Henry Street. They were later seen to call on L.J. O'Toole at Croke Park. Walsh returned to his shop at 7 p.m. where with the carpenter he appeared to be making some alteration in the fittings. He spent the greater part of the evening afterwards walking about the City with his cousin, P. Walsh (Arnott & Co). He did not return during the day to 37 Haddington Road but at 10.45 p.m. in company with his carpenter friend he was seen to enter 20 Blessington Street where he retired for the night. Walsh is now said to have cancelled his passage to America and no doubt intends to settle down in business at the address given.
