Subject, MOVEMENTS OF DUBLIN EXTREMISTS.

I beg to report that on the 15th. and 16th. Inst., the undermentioned extremists were observed moving about and associating with each other as follows:-

With Thomas J. Clarke, 75, Parnell St., on Saturday, John McGarry for a quarter of an hour between 1 & 2 p. m. E. Daly, B. Parsons, M. Foley, Alphonsus Keevlahan and D. O'Toole - Limerick, for half an hour between 2 & 3 p. m. The two latter returned to Limerick by 6-15 p. m. train. R.I.C. informed. Thomas McCarthy, J. J. Buggy, M. W. O'Reilly, J. R. Reynolds and John O'Sullivan, Cork, for twenty minutes between 8 & 9 p. m. M. O'Hanrahan and F. J. McCabe for a few minutes at 9 p. m. Chas. S. Power and John Neeson, Drogheda, from 9-30 till 9-45 p. m. Pierce Beasley and John McDermott for a quarter of an hour from 10-15 p. m. Wm. O'Leary Curtis for ten minutes from 11 p. m., after which Clarke closed his premises for the night.

Mellows, and Thomas McCarthy were present at a
meeting of the General Council, Irish Volunteers,
at 2, Dawson St. from 12 noon to 3 p. m. As
far as can be ascertained, the meeting was en-
gaged in dealing with reports respecting Fin-
ance and Organising work. Some discussion fol-
lowed on Conscription, which, though not extend-
ed to Ireland now, might, it was urged, be ap-
plied later on and they should not relax their
hostility to the principle of the Bill.

About 240 Irish Volunteers, 228 of whom
carried rifles, in charge of E. Daly, F. Fahy,
Joseph McGuinness and Gerald Griffin assembled
at 41, Parnell Square, at 8-45 a. m. and sub-
sequently went route marching towards Finglas.
