. About 65 members of the Sinn Fein Volunteers, 8 of whom carried rifles, left 41, Parnell Sqr. at $8.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m} \cdot$, and in command of Frank Fahy went route marching towards Fairview. They returned at $10.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and dismissed without further parade.
