I beg to report that on the 2nd. Inst. he hader Suulany the undermentioned extremists were observed moving about and associating with each other as follows :-

With Thomas J. Clarke, 75, Parnell St., John Milroy for a few minutes between 7 & 8 John T. Kelly, T. C., for a quarter of an hour between 8 & 9 p. m. J. O'Connor D. Lynch; and Wm. O'Leary Curtis in conversation with Clarke for some considerable time from 9 p. m.

M. J. O'Rahilly passing along Sackville St. between 12 & 1 p. m. Pierce

between 10 & 11 p. m.

About 65 members of the Sinn Fein Volunteers, 8 of whom carried rifles, left 41,

Parnell Sqr. at 8. 30 p. m., and in command
of Frank Fahy went route marching towards

Fairview. They returned at 10. 30 p. m.
and dismissed without further parade.
