



Memo.

The normal conditions governing a hard labour prisoner in custody for one month are-

1. To be bathed on reception unless otherwise directed by Governor or Medical Officer.
2. To wear prison clothes unless specially exempted.
3. To occupy an ordinary cell.
4. To be kept in separation.
5. To perform such hard labour tasks as the Medical Officer may certify the prisoner fit for.
6. To receive Class A and B diet.
7. To be given books of secular and religious instruction.

---

(a) A prisoner is not allowed library books during first 28 days of imprisonment.

(b) A prisoner is not entitled to receive either letters or visits while undergoing a sentence of less than two months, but if special application is made by a prisoner for permission to receive a visit or write and receive a letter the case is considered and permission is as a rule granted if good cause is shown.

The conditions set forth above have practically been dispensed with inasmuch as these prisoners are wearing their own clothes, located in association wards in Hospital and receive Class D diet (that of 1st Class *Widemannartha*). They also have library books.

As regards paragraph (b) only special visits for cause shown have been permitted. Every endeavour is being made to minimise communication with the outside public.



Privileges granted to Suffragette prisoners confined in Tullamore Prison in February 1913 in excess of the privileges that may be granted under the Rules for First Class Misdemeanants.

1. They were not required to pay the usual charge of 6d per day for the use of special furniture and bedding and for the services of a prisoner who cleaned up their rooms.
2. They were allowed to go to bed and get up at choice and to have artificial light in their rooms up to 9.45 p.m.
3. They were allowed to associate and converse together at exercise and also at certain periods of the day and evening in their rooms.
4. The requirement that no prison allowance of food was to be permitted at any meal for which they procured or received food at their own expense was not insisted upon.
