About 65 members of the Sinn Fein Volunteers, 8 of whom carried rifles, left 41, Parnell Sqr. at 8. 30 p. m., and in command of Frank Fahy went route marching towards Fairview. They returned at 10. 30 p. m. and dismissed without further parade.

Mrs Newman has left Dublin for Liverpool, from where it is said she will sail by the s.s. St. Paul, on 4th. Inst. for New York.
