I beg to report that on the 9th inst., the undermentioned extremists were observed moving about and associating with each other as follows :-

With Thomas J. Clarke, 75 Parnell St., D. Lynch and Major John McBride for half an hour between 12 & 1 p.m. C.S. Power, B.L. and John T. Kelly, T.C. from 8.30 to 8.45 p.m. John O'Mahony and J.J. Buggy for a quarter of an hour between 9 & 10 p.m. Wm. O'L. Curtis and James Murray for half an hour from 10 p.m.

H. Mellows in Volunteer Office 2 Dawson St., from 11 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

Fifty members of the Sinn Féin Volunteers assembled at 41 Parnell Sqr. at 8.45 p.m. and afterwards, in charge of P. Beasley, without rifles, went route-marching towards Clonliffe Road. They returned at 10.30 p.m. and dismissed without further parade.
